



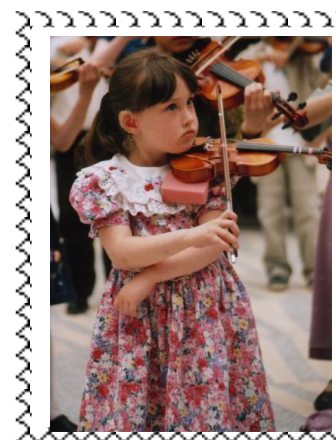
Dr. Shinichi Suzuki

What is the Suzuki Method?

The Suzuki Method is a way of learning music based on the teachings of the late Dr. Shinichi Suzuki. Dr. Suzuki identified the key elements in early childhood language acquisition and applied them to music education. This “mother tongue” method stresses listening, repetition and step-by-step growth as parents, children and teachers work together to develop the children’s potential.

Learning the Suzuki way means....

- Beginning at an early stage. (4-6 years old) Young children can learn music in the same way they learn a language, by listening to others.
- Parental involvement. Parents learn the instrument with their children in the first year of study. They act as “home teachers” during daily practice sessions.
- Listening and observing. By listening to musical recordings and observing other students and teachers performing, the Suzuki students “absorb” the music before they begin to play.
- Creating a positive environment. Suzuki students thrive in an environment where respect, praise and encouragement combine to motivate them.
- Step-by-step mastery. Each technical skill is broken down into very small steps. Students progress at their own rate.
- Attending private and group lessons. Suzuki students receive one private lesson and one group lesson per week. Group lessons serve to reinforce skills, motivate children and provide a sense of community.
- Learning to read music. Students begin to read music as soon as the basic skills of beautiful tone and accurate intonation are mastered.
- Acquiring a rich musical repertoire. Beginning with familiar folk tunes and progressing through popular works of the great composers, Suzuki has organized a wealth of musical material.
- Every child can learn! Talent is innate. The rich environment of the Suzuki method nurtures every child’s unique talent.

The Society for Talent Education

Founded in 1965, is a registered, charitable, non-profit organization established to foster the musical development of children and their parents. As a registered Canadian charitable organization, official income tax receipts are issued for all corporate and individual donations, as well as fees paid for music lessons. Currently we have 18 teachers and 156 students.

Society for Talent Education in Edmonton offers:

- Individual and Group Lessons: They consist of one individual lesson and one one-hour group lesson on either the violin, viola, cello and bass. Start children between the ages of 4-6 (other ages are considered according to teacher availability) and can continue till they are 18 years old.
- Performing regularly. In addition to two full-program concerts, students have many opportunities to perform at other events within the program and in the community such as hospitals, senior citizens' homes and schools. These performances build confidence and self-esteem.
- Developing orchestral and ensemble skills. Our more advanced students take part in orchestra and chamber music classes as well as Suzuki repertoire classes. Many senior students are active in community orchestras.
- Scholarships and Bursaries: The society has offered the Jed Fisk Scholarship since 1987. Joint Music bursary was created with Suzuki Charter School in 2011. It is our hope to provide further scholarships and bursaries to families in need and students wishing to take music lessons with us.



We believe that through the teaching of music, using the method developed by Dr. Shinichi Suzuki, all children can develop sensitivity and discipline, become good citizens and fulfill their potential as human beings.

Who are the Teachers?

All teachers in the Society for Talent Education Program have extensive musical training from various universities. In addition, they all have received specialized Suzuki teacher training and are members of the Suzuki Association of the Americas. Teachers regularly upgrade their knowledge in an ongoing pursuit of excellence. Beginners are matched and assigned to teachers during the observation period.

What is the Parent's Role?

Being a Suzuki parent calls for the same skills that we all try to develop in our day-to-day roles as parents. The commitment of time and energy includes the following:

- ❖ Completing the Beginner Programme
- ❖ Attending each private and group lesson
- ❖ Practicing daily with the student at home
- ❖ Listening to Suzuki recordings daily.
- ❖ Creating a nurturing environment for learning and encouragement
- ❖ Attending an Annual General Meeting
- ❖ Participating in Fundraising and Volunteering

Where are the Lessons?

Group and private lessons are held at the Society for Talent Education located at 5540-106 Ave. Some private lessons are also taught in teachers' homes located throughout the city.

Lesson Fees

Lessons fees for beginning students are \$141/month and including a 30-minute lesson and 50 minutes group class.

Our teaching year runs from September to June. Fees are subject to change.
